





Improv Mosaic 1.2.3 Workshop



Learn the concept of building an improvised mosaic quilt using improvised log cabin blocks at ratios of 1:2:3 (Large: 3", 6" & 9" blocks; Medium: 2", 4", & 6" blocks; or Small: 1", 2", & 3" block).

In this workshop you'll create an Improv Mosaic 20"x20" or 24"x24" sized pillow or wall hanging using the "Medium" scale blocks (6", 3", 2"). Participants will leave with a pattern layout and the skills to build a larger throw or bed quilt. This is a fantastic process for using scraps – even the smallest pieces!

Participants learn how simply and quickly make numerous small log cabin blocks via "scrappy chain piecing", and how to use these small starter blocks to create unique medium and large blocks. Participants can use the pattern and ratios to "riff" on what's learned in class to create their own block designs and versions beyond the log cabin blocks taught in class.

Supply List:

- Quilting Cotton:
 - Approximately 1.5 2 yards of a wide variety of fabric the more variety the better!
 - NOTE: This is a perfect project for tiny pieces, strips, weird sizes that you have hanging around! The blocks we'll be making will be 2.5", 4.5" and 6.5" – and are built with strips and pieces from the starting 2.5" blocks we'll make.
 - Bring your scrap bins for you and to share!
 - Solids, or fine blenders/batiks that read as solid.
 - o As many colors as you have on hand! Bring your scraps even the very small pieces!
- Sewing Machine
- Neutral thread
- Rotary cutter/cutting mat
- Acrylic ruler to cut strips whatever you use (I love my 3"x18" ruler)
- 6.5" acrylic block ruler (if you happen to have a 4.5" and a 2.5" acrylic block ruler, bring as well, but no need to go out and purchase.)
- Iron/ironing pad (or access to one)
- Small Design wall (24" x 24" piece of batting or white flannel)

Reimagined: Artful Quilts from Everyday Cloth

Ever wondered how to 'reimagine' clothing to use for quilts? Not sure how or where to start? This workshop will help you take the leap to turn repurposed clothing to memorable quilts and help you exercise your improvisational creative muscles!


In this workshop you'll learn how to 'debone' a shirt or other sewn garment to garner fabric – and pieces large and small - for your quilt. We'll discuss improv concepts such as making choices as you go, embracing imperfection, and taking small steps to get started. With guided exploration, we focus on the enjoyment of the process and the satisfaction of creating something unique!

Workshop Length/Price:

One six-hour day \$750 (plus travel/expenses)

Supply List

- 7+ (or more) men's dress shirts from thrift stores, castoffs, etc.
 - o Range of darks, mediums and lights
 - o Cotton, poly or blends -stick to wovens and no knits fabrics
- Seam Ripper (for popping off buttons)
- Rotary cutter/cutting mat
- Container for removed buttons.
- Sewing Machine
- Neutral thread
- Acrylic ruler (whatever you like to use)
- Small Design wall (24" x 24" piece of batting or white flannel)



QUILTING IN THE FOG

String Theory 3 Ways Workshop







Join us to learn the versatile "String Block" for quilting. String blocks are an excellent starter block for the novice quilter, and a fun basic block for all quilters to use to explore new techniques and designs - and use up scraps! In "String Theory 3 Ways", you'll learn how to make improvisational string blocks using a fabric foundation (I suggest an old sheet) and create simple square shape as well as oblong blocks using the "stitch and flip" method. Tap into your creative self and explore your own designs and personality. You can add interest through varying your strip shapes and including inserts. Stretch your improvisational muscles while using those scrap strips!

Workshop Length/Price:

One six-hour day \$750 (plus travel/expenses)

Supply List:

- Approximately 2-3 yards of a repurposed light-colored sheet or muslin fabric which will be cut
 up to serve as the base for your blocks. I use my old white, worn sheets. These will be used
 as a pattern, base for your blocks and won't be seen once you sew the strips onto it.
- An assortment of fabric strips/scraps and/or pieces that can be cut up or sewing into strips (woven fabric - no knit fabric such as t-shirts). Cast off men's shirting can be used or cut up cotton clothing as well.
- Thread for machine neutral color (gray/off-white) or something that blends with whatever fabric you choose.
- Scissors
- 45" or 60" Rotary cutter
- An acrylic ruler and/or any acrylic guilting block rulers you might have and like to use.
 - o If you are in the market for an acrylic block ruler, I suggest getting a 6.5". You can choose from a variety at Joann's or Amazon.
- Portable cutting matt
- Sewing pins
- Glue stick
- Pencil, chalk or disappearing ink pen for marking
- Iron/pad or board

QUILTING IN THE FOG

Loving Hands Quilt Workshop



What better way to personalize a quilt than with the hands of loved ones? This is the perfect quilt to make for a special person: to honor a teacher using the handprints of students, a grandparent using the hands of children and grandchildren, or a friend using handprints of their team, book club, or workmates.

With photocopied handprints, participants will use the handprint as a pattern to cut out and create a negative and positive block from each handprint. Participants can even personalize and embellish the handprints with fabric or beaded jewelry. Each block is machine sewn down in your choice of applique patterns.

I will show you ways to complete your top and options for sashing and quilting.

- 6 hours (includes 1 hour break/lunch for participants if they choose)
- \$750 plus travel costs

Supply List

- Prep: Photocopies of participant handprints (directions will be provided to get best results)
- At least two contrasting fabrics: 2-3 yards of various light fabrics and 2-3 yards of various dark fabrics
- Terial Magic Spray-on fabric stabilizer
- Iron and towel (for ironing sprayed fabric so not to get on your ironing board.)
- Sharp cutting shears
- Sharp, precise embroidery scissors or small scissors
- X-acto Knife
- Tweezers
- Glue Stick
- Acrylic Ruler & cutting mat
